

The United States Botanic Garden

The United States Botanic Garden (USBG) is a living plant museum. It is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., free of charge. Exhibits interpret the role of plants in supporting earth's diverse and fragile ecosystems and in enriching human life. Established by Congress in 1820, the U.S. Botanic Garden is one of the oldest botanic gardens in North America. The Garden has been administered through the Architect of the Capitol since 1934. It is recognized as a museum and accredited by the American Alliance of Museums.

The U.S. Botanic Garden **Conservatory** is located on the National Mall at the intersection of Maryland Avenue and First Street SW, adjacent to the U.S. Capitol. The address is 100 Maryland Avenue SW, Washington, DC 20001.

The **Conservatory** houses permanent collections of plants from subtropical, tropical and arid regions and showcases orchids, medicinal, economic, endangered and Jurassic plants. From late May to mid-October, the Conservatory terrace features thematic displays.

The **National Garden** is adjacent to the Conservatory. It features a Mid-Atlantic native plant garden, Rose Garden, First Ladies Water Garden, Butterfly Garden and Amphitheater.

Bartholdi Park is across Independence Avenue from the Conservatory. Here visitors will find a tapestry of theme gardens surrounding the historic Bartholdi Fountain. The gardens suggest interesting plants and designs at a scale suitable for the home landscape.

Parking is not available at the U.S. Botanic Garden on weekdays. It is accessible by public transportation. The Federal Center SW Station on the Orange and Blue Lines of Metrorail is at Third and D Streets SW, four blocks from the USBG. Metrobuses 32, 34 and 36 stop at Independence Avenue and First Street SW, between the Conservatory and Bartholdi Park.

Free 45-minute highlight tours of the U.S. Botanic Garden Conservatory may be available on the day of your visit. Please check at the Visitor Information Desk upon your arrival. To arrange a group tour, which requires a four-week advance reservation, please call (202) 226-2055. Groups of 10 to 15 adults may reserve a free 45-minute guided tour of the Conservatory Monday through Friday.





RUST NEVER SLEEPS: A GLOBAL APPROACH TO FIGHTING DEADLY DISEASES OF WHEAT

Stem rust has plagued wheat farmers for millennia, but new superstrains coming out of East Africa have the potential to overcome 80% of the world's wheat crop. Dr. Ronnie Coffman, the director of the Durable Rust Resistance in Wheat Project, will outline the challenges faced by this international consortium of scientists and some of the successes in securing the world's wheat crop, especially among smallholder farmers in Asia and Africa.

WALKING WITH WHEAT: A JOURNEY THROUGH HISTORY, BOTANY AND CULTURE

STAFF AT THE U.S. CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER, NATIONAL GALLERY OF ART AND U.S. BOTANIC GARDEN

Come explore the wonderful world of wheat during this joint program between the U.S. Capitol Visitor Center, National Gallery of Art and U.S. Botanic Garden. This walking tour program begins at the U.S. Capitol Visitor Center, where staff will lead a discussion about plant

scientist and wheat pioneer Dr. Norman Borlaug. A statue of Dr. Borlaug, representing the state of Iowa, was unveiled on March 25, 2014, as part of the National Statuary Hall Collection. The tour continues at the U.S. Botanic Garden's *Amber Waves of Grain* exhibit with a close-up look at the variety and science of wheat. The tour concludes at the National Gallery of Art with an exploration of wheat's impact on visual culture, including the National Gallery of Art's newly acquired "Green Wheat Fields, Auvers" by Vincent van Gogh. Bring your walking shoes

and get ready to learn all about wheat's importance and influence in our lives! **Please note:** This is a walking tour, with portions being held outdoors. URBAN AGRICULTURE: SOWING SEEDS, SOWING MONEY

CAROLYN DIMITRI, PROFESSOR,

Urban agriculture has captured the attention of policymakers, urban dwellers, and those involved in the "good food movement." Yet farming in the city, similar to rural farming, is a risky venture that may not be profitable. As a result, many urban farms are formed as nonprofits rather than traditional, commercial farms, which raises the question of what a farm really is. This question has challenged the two government agencies (Census Bureau and Dept. of Agriculture) that





have collected data on farm numbers since the 1800s. Dr. Dimitri will discuss the benefits of urban farming, as well as the challenges facing urban farmers who seek to add to the food that makes up part of the local food system. The analysis is based on findings from a recent survey of urban farms across the US. **Please note:** Program offered on Sunday, September 14 is a repeat of the program offered on Saturday, September 13.

Carolyn Dimitri is an applied economist with expertise in food systems and food policy. She is currently on the faculty of the Department of Nutrition, Food Studies and Public Health of New York University. Dr. Dimitri is widely recognized as a leading expert on the procurement and marketing of organic food, and has published extensively on the distribution, processing, retailing, and consumption of organic food. More recent work includes urban food system issues, such as food access and urban farming systems. Prior to joining the NYU faculty in 2010, Dr. Dimitri worked as a research economist at the Economic Research Service of the US Department of Agriculture for more than a decade. She earned a PhD in Agricultural and Natural Resource Economics from the University of Maryland, College Park, and a BA in Economics from the University at Buffalo.



WORKSHOP

MEDIEVAL ILLUMINATION

JEAN BRINTON-JAECKS, ARTIST

This workshop is a historical overview of the egg tempera and 24k gold leaf technique utilized by manuscript artists from the 4th to the 14th century. In a studio setting, students will work from the Botanic Garden's rich collection of flower and plant specimens, as well as insects, shells, feathers and other natural objects provided by the instructor to design and create their own illumination.

The course will examine traditional egg tempera techniques. Students will learn the grinding of natural mineral pigments, the making and application of egg tempera paint in addition to raised gold leaf as a manuscript embellishment on calfskin vellum. The study of herbal manuscripts, bestiaries and illuminated manuscripts portraying flowers, insects, birds and shells from the Late Antique to the Renaissance will enhance the learning experience. **Please note:** Materials list can be found with the online listing.
