ABOUT THE GARDEN

The United States Botanic Garden (USBG) is the oldest continuously operating public garden in North America and informs visitors about the importance, value, and diversity of plants, as well as their aesthetic, cultural, economic, therapeutic, and ecological significance. With more than a million visitors annually, the USBG strives to demonstrate and promote sustainable practices. The Garden is accredited by the American Alliance of Museums and Botanic Gardens Conservation International.

HISTORY

More than 200 years ago, George Washington had a vision for a botanic garden in the nation's new capital city. This garden would demonstrate and promote the importance of plants to the young nation. The Garden was established by Congress in 1820 and strengthened by collections from the U.S. Exploring Expedition (1838-1842). Since 1934, it has been administered through the Architect of the Capitol.

LIVING COLLECTIONS

The Garden maintains approximately 65,000 plants for exhibition, study, conservation, and exchange with other institutions. Noteworthy collections include economic plants, medicinal plants, orchids, carnivorous plants, cacti and succulents, and Mid-Atlantic native plants. Several plants collected during the U.S. Exploring Expedition are still on display.



Conservatory Map


